

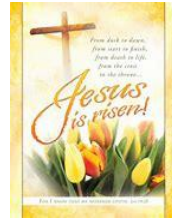

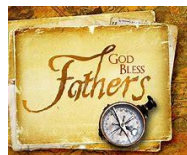

Rhubarb Cream Pie

3 cups rhubarb, cleaned and cut into pieces

3 T flour

½ tsp. nutmeg

1 ½ cups sugar

2 eggs, well beaten

1 or 2 T butter



This takes a double pie crust. Line pie pan with pastry. Arrange rhubarb slices evenly in the pastry lined pan. Combine flour, nutmeg, and sugar, then add the well beaten eggs to the dry ingredients. Pour over rhubarb. Dot with butter before laying over the top crust. Bake at 350 degrees until golden brown. Serves 6 to 8.

Rhea F. Miller was the only daughter of Martin and Bertha Ross. Rhea's father was a drunk who never really wanted anything to do with religion. In spite of her husband's drunkenness, her mother was faithful to God and prayed diligently. Eventually God answered her prayers and her husband surrendered to God's spirit and he was wonderfully delivered from the bondage of sin. One night during a church service Martin stood to his feet and began his testimony of how much Jesus meant to him. It was these words Rhea heard her father say, "I'd rather have Jesus than silver or gold, I'd rather have Jesus than anything this world affords today." It was in 1922 Rhea penned the poem, "I'd Rather have Jesus". Rhea married Dr. H.V. Miller, one of the general superintendents of the Church of the Nazarene. They lived a wonderful life, and then after his death Rhea began to teach piano. She traveled around the area in her little gray Nash coop on a special mission to teach the children of pastors to play the piano so they would have something to contribute when they became adults. She was a very inspirational woman, always positive and always smiling.

Bev Shea, also a mother who was instrumental in her child's life, left a copy of this poem on the piano in their home. Wanting her son to find it in the hopes it would encourage him to change the direction of his life. At the piano one day, playing and singing he found the words and began to read. Inspired so much, he thought about his own goals and ambitions as he began singing those words to a tune that just seemed to fit. His mother, after hearing him sing encouraged him to sing it at church. George Beverly Shea was 23 when he composed the music to this song and eventually he went on to sing for Billy Graham. It is a hymn that could change your life, encourage your faith and truly help you believe in the power of God. Because really, what would we have if we didn't have Jesus.

Chicken Noodle Hot Dish

Ingredients:

- 4 oz. broad noodles
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 cup milk
- ½ tsp salt
- 1 5 oz can chicken – chopped
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 cup crushed potato chips – for the top



Cook noodles as directed on package. Blend together soup and milk. Add chicken and noodles. Place in greased 2-quart casserole dish. Top with potato chips and bake at 350 degrees for 35 – 40 minutes.

**You can also add 1 can of drained peas to the casserole before baking.

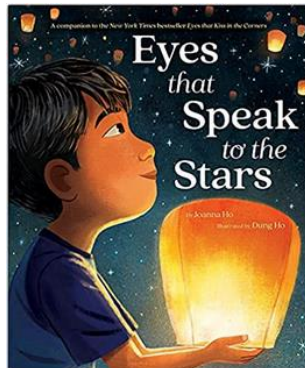
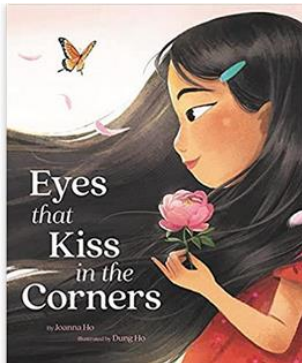
Children's Book Suggestion

The book "Eyes That Kiss in the Corners," written by Joanna Ho and illustrated by Dung Ho is a picture book written for ages 4 to 8 years but because of the subject, writing skill of the author and illustrations, is a book that can be enjoyed by all ages. It's the story of a young Asian girl who notices that her eyes are different from the other children at school. She realizes that they are the same as her mother's, her grandmother's, and her little sister's. They have eyes that kiss in the corners, glow like warm tea, and crinkle into crescent moons. She gathers strength, self-acceptance, a sense of beauty in her uniqueness, and respect for her roots from her family in this amazing and beautiful story.

A sequel/companion book was written by the same author and illustrator titled "Eyes That Speak to the Stars". This is another picture book written for the same age group as the first. It is the story of a young Asian boy. When a classmate at his school draws a hurtful picture of him, he takes comfort from his family. Again, it's the fact that his eyes are shaped differently than his other classmates. Inspired by the men in his family, he draws on the strength and wisdom of his family to find himself – to recognize his own power and strength from within.

"Eyes that Kiss in the Corners", a New York Times Bestseller and #1 Indie Bestseller as well as a School Library Journal Best Book of 2021, received many additional awards when released. "Eyes that Speak to the Stars" was newly released this year and appears to be doing well also. It was an Amazon January Best Book of the Month.

The winter of 2022 got off to a late start and then tried to make up for it by dumping so much snow on northeastern Ohio that some people were immobilized for days. It happened that after a second bout of Covid and the severe weather, I began working from home instead of my usual drive to work. I found I liked it and am finding it hard to go back to the office full time.

I have my laptop set up on my dining room table and everything I need to work with surrounds me. Since I work so much there it's hard not to notice the little imperfections in the surface of the table. I was in high school when my parents bought this table and when they moved away to Florida it became mine. Over time it's gathered marks from my dad tossing his keys on it, my sister-in-law marking off dress patterns for my niece making traces with the rotary wheel like little dotted lines, and my son pressing too hard with his pencil doing his homework. I can clearly see the word "VOID" imprinted where my mom wanted to be sure the word was clear when she voided a check. There's a history lesson of my family in the marks left behind on this table. It's no wonder I have kept it over the years since it holds memories of my childhood and family – like a photo album might.

Several years ago, I went to visit my cousin, Rhonda in Pennsylvania for a weekend. When we got up the first morning I was there she offered me my choice of things for breakfast. She told me she was having something that she had quite often and asked me if I would like to try it. She said she had been eating it since she was a child but didn't know where she got it from since no one else she knew ate it. It was peanut butter toast dunked in a cup of hot chocolate. When she told me what it was I just laughed and told her I knew exactly where she got it from – the same place I had. Our aunt Dot loved that for breakfast, and I had been eating that too since I was a child. Both of us had spent a lot of time when we were growing up around my aunt and grandmother. That breakfast was only one of the many things my aunt impressed on me when I was young just by the example she set.

We pick up things like mannerisms and likes (food, clothes, habits) from the people around us as we travel through life, making an impression on us even if it's not in a conscious manner. That's why it's best to choose our friends

with care. We can't choose our family, but we can try learning only from their better traits. Children are like sponges and absorb knowledge and behavior from everything in their world, good or bad. As adults we do the same only to a much lesser degree. The influence of another person on us doesn't mean it's as obvious as them preaching or pushing behavior on us as it is in the quiet example they set in their behavior and how they present themselves. Seeing how they treat other people, how they handle a stressful situation, how they handle their finances, how they show love or fear, how they worship God. All that can make an impression as deep as the marks on my table and last as long as a lifetime.

When Jesus gathered His disciples and taught them about the Father, the impressions He left on them were so deeply ingrained that they suffered many hardships and most met with horrific ends but never let go of what they learned from Jesus. That was because they believed with all their heart and soul that the teachings of Jesus came from God. While traveling with Jesus and witnessing how He loved, healed, drove out demons, and performed miracles, they listened and watched and learned. They would find later that they had it in their power to do the same. So, after Jesus left them they took what they learned and traveled the country doing as Jesus had taught them to do. By His teaching and the example He set, the disciples and other followers spread the gospel not to just their friends and family but went out and planted those seeds of wisdom everywhere they traveled. By their example of good works, behavior, and teaching, the Word of God continued to spread and take root. The roots of those first plantings have now spread across the entire world – from generation to generation.
