# The Spice of Death December 17, 2024



And Nicodemus, who at first came to Jesus by night, also came, bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about a hundred pounds. ~ John 19:39

Recommended Reading: Mark 15:23

The Magi gave Jesus gold, signifying His kingship, frankincense, signifying His priesthood, and myrrh, signifying the death He would one day submit to (Matthew 2:11). At the time they gave their gifts to Jesus, did they know He would one day die an unusual death? Did they know the Old Testament prophecies about the Messiah dying—for example, Psalm 22? We don't know what they knew, but providentially they gave gifts to Jesus that signified whom He would become: King, Priest, and Savior.

Myrrh was a bitter herb that was used when preparing the body of a deceased person for burial. The apostle John tells us that Nicodemus brought a hundred-pound mixture of myrrh and aloes with which to prepare Jesus' body for burial after the crucifixion. Myrrh had another use—as a sedative, or pain killer. Mark tells us that Jesus was offered a mix of wine and myrrh as He hung on the cross to deaden His pain - "But He did not take it" (Mark 15:23).

Give thanks today that Jesus "endured the cross" (Hebrews 12:2) for your salvation.

#### Marcie's Book Corner

Calling all singles, freshly married couples, and all of you married for decades as well!! & &

Couples pledge to "love and to cherish, till death do us part." Most of us understand the love part-commitment, putting the other person first, but what does it mean to cherish our spouses?

Author Gary Thomas, in his book entitled **Cherish**, tells us that word can change everything for your marriage. He shows us the difference between love and cherish with scripture. One example is... love thinks about others with selflessness. "...love is not proud, it does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking." (1 Cor 13:4-5). Cherish thinks about its beloved with praise. "Your voice is sweet, and your face is lovely." (Song of Solomon 2:14) Gary encourages us that learning to cherish our spouse when there is discord, or even when there's a strong love, can take love to an entirely new level.

Having been in a happy, satisfying marriage with my husband for 29 years, I wondered if this was a book that I needed to read, but even the title "Cherish" drew me in, I wanted to learn more. After I read it, I found myself admitting that maybe I should reevaluate some of my own actions and reactions in practicing what cherish means in my life.

At the end of each chapter is a review of important points. Also, there are questions for discussion and reflection.

Some interesting chapter descriptions include...

- \*Cherishing means learning to showcase your spouse.
- \*Cherishing is about protecting each other and killing contempt.
- \*Cherishing teaches us to indulge our spouses and thus help heal their spiritual wounds!
- \*Cherishing means being patient with your spouse's sin; "we all stumble in many ways". James 3:2.
- \*Making it easier for our mates to cherish us!
- \*Biblical power to keep on cherishing I didn't quit.

The author deals with the good, the bad, and the ugly in a marriage and how to still be able to cherish one another.

He also shares real life stories of couples he counseled that will make you chuckle; some will make you shake your head in disbelief. When Gary and his wife Lisa share their own mistakes in cherishing one another  $\bigcirc$ , you realize it might be a little harder than it sounds, but it's definitely worth the effort! I wholeheartedly recommend this book to you to read or to give to someone you love!

Then, reaching into her coat pocket... she pulled

#### Golden Corn Casserole

3 eggs 1 carton (8 oz.) french onion dip ½ cup butter, softened 1 pkg (8 ½ oz.) corn bread/muffin mix ½ tsp salt ½ tsp pepper

1 can (15 1/4 oz.) whole kernel corn, drained

1 can (14 ¾ oz.) cream style corn

In a large bowl, beat the eggs, add French onion dip, butter, corn bread mix, salt and pepper until combined. Stir in the corn. Pour into a greased 11 in.  $\times$  7 in. baking dish. Bake, uncovered at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes or until edges are lightly browned and pulled away from the sides of the dish.





# **Songs We Love**

With the Christmas season fast approaching, I began looking over what song I was going to write about. I thought about several old Christmas hymns but decided on a "newer" one—and one of my particular favorites- - "Mary, Did You Know?".

Mark Lowry wrote the lyrics to this song. He was born in 1958 to Charles and Bev Lowry and grew up in Houston, Texas. His mother was also a song writer and singer and apparently Mark inherited her talents. You may remember Mark for his comedy and singing with the Gaither Vocal Band.

Lowry had been asked to write something for a Christmas concert at Thomas Road Baptist Church in Lynchburg Virginia, then led by Jerry Falwell. He wrote the lyrics of "Mary, Did You Know?" in 1984 and used it in the Christmas program. Lowry used questions he had with his mother about Jesus and Mary, basically what it was like to raise the Son of God. These discussions with his mother led to forming the basis of the song. It took seven more years for him to find someone to write the music. While on tour with the Gaithers, he showed the lyrics to Buddy Greene, who also played with the Gaithers. Buddy spent a day listening to Christmas carols written in minor keys, like "What Child is This" and "We Three Kings" before writing the melody for "Mary, Did You Know?". Greene thought the music in a minor key would be beautiful for this song. This song was first recorded by Christian singer Michael English, and later by several big names in the music business such as Dolly Parton and Carrie Underwood.

Even though the title is rhetorical, Mary did know several things. She knew she had found favor with God, that she would bear a son and name Him Jesus, the Son of God, and that His birth was the result of the Holy Spirit.

Mark, who has never been married, treats his songs as his children. He says "Mary, Did You Know" has grown a life of its own and he hopes it will point people to the story of the baby Jesus and what His arrival and life means. Hopefully it will lead people to Luke 1 to find out what Mary knew.

# **Imparting Gifts**

"For I want very much to see you, so I may impart to you some spiritual gift to strengthen you." ~Romans 1:11

Your life affects those you have contact with, whether you intend it or not. It may be a positive experience for them or a negative one, but your life will affect others.

Paul wanted to leave a spiritual blessing with other believers. He had heard of the Christians in Rome, and he longed to go to them to build them up in their faith. Paul always mentioned the Roman believers in his prayers, even though he had never met them (Rom. 1:10). While he waited for an opportunity to visit Rome, Paul wrote a letter to the church. His letter to the Romans is one of the most cherished and challenging books in the New Testament.

We should share Paul's goal of leaving a spiritual blessing with everyone around us. We have opportunities to strengthen our parents, our children, our friends, our coworkers, and our fellow Christians. Spiritual blessings are not given haphazardly, but by choice. Our self-centeredness may cause us only to seek blessings from others rather than to impart them. Only when we are determined to focus on giving a blessing rather than receiving a blessing will we have the quality of ministry to others that God gave to Paul.

You may not realize it, but your life has the potential to bless everyone you encounter. Are others strengthened and encouraged in their faith because of their relationship with you? Do you usually look at others in terms of what they can do for you or in terms of how you can encourage them? As you go about your day, strive to be a positive influence on everyone you encounter!

She must have tried the main door to see if she could get in that way, but no one answered of course. So, she went to the door leading into the mud room by the kitchen door. The previous owner did some very shoddy handy man jobs on my house and Gretchen discovered yet another one. He had put an interior hollow door up in place of a solid exterior door. Gretchen's frantic scratching to get in
